

**VISION:** Elko Committee Against Domestic Violence believes that every person has the right not to be abused and everyone is entitled to live their life free of violence.

**OBJECTIVES:**

- ◆ To provide direct, comprehensive, and confidential services to all individuals experiencing stalking, domestic, family, and sexual violence. Services include, but are not limited to crisis intervention, counseling, advocacy, and survival skills
- ◆ To provide emergency and temporary shelter to victims of violence and their non-offending family members.
- ◆ To increase the accessibility to services provided by of Elko



Committee Against Domestic Violence within the service area.

- ◆ To provide support, advocacy to victims and referrals to appropriate agencies and services (including, but not limited to law enforcement, legal, medical, psychological,

vocational, social services, and other non-profit organizations).

- ◆ To provide services without any discrimination based on race, religion, color, age, sex, marital status, sexual orientation, national origin, or ancestry.
- ◆ To support and promote current public policies toward the elimination of stalking, domestic, family, and sexual violence and relief for its victims.
- ◆ To advocate for future public policies that work toward the elimination of stalking, domestic, family, and sexual violence and relief for its victims.
- ◆ To implement preventative measures to impact the generational cycle of abuse.
- ◆ To educate the public and other agencies on all issues regarding stalking, domestic, family, and sexual violence.
- ◆ To increase community awareness and involvement with Elko Committee Against Domestic Violence and its work, including increasing name recognition and community partnerships.
- ◆ To provide leadership and practical assistance in the areas of stalking, domestic, family, and sexual violence with a primary focus on violence against women.
- ◆ To receive at least 15% of its money from sources other than public bodies as required by N.R.S.217.420.

**Outreach:** The isolation of Northeastern Nevada makes it necessary to develop of a variety of methods to provide services. It is impossible to list all of CADV's partners, formal and/or collaborative efforts. A few include:

- State of Nevada's Attorney General's Office (outreach to White Pine and Eureka), White Pine-Eureka Victim-Witness Services, Nevada Network Against Domestic Violence (funding and networking with other victim agencies and the legislature), Elko Police Department, Elko County Sheriff's Department, West Wendover Police Department Nevada State Welfare, Division of Child and Family Services, and Elko County Welfare.

**Education and Prevention:** Presentations and trainings are available through Elko Committee Against Domestic Violence. Programs are tailored to each audience, and the requested information. Trainings are requested and available for all age groups. The Executive Director is certified in several training disciplines, including P.O.S.T. certification (law enforcement training) . Elko Committee Against Domestic Violence also participates in health fairs, "Cops Night Out", and other community events. CADV sponsors awareness activities, volunteer trainings, organization specific presentations, and maintains an informational website. CADV sponsored events are free and open to the public.
